Selim Nassib's novel, based on the life of Om Kalthoum, the peasant girl whose enormous talent made her Egypt's most celebrated artist and

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brought her unprecedented fame from all corners of the Arab world, is as passionately told as the story it recounts was lived. The tale of this great twentieth-century singer is told by Ahmed Rami, the poet-librettist who furnished Kalthoum the words to

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her songs and who loved her in vain. Kalthoum, forced to disguise herself as a boy at the outset of her career, became her troubled country's most beloved performer and a living symbol of Egypt's rebirth. Her meteoric rise to international stardom and her

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astounding ability to maintain her popularity through the deep cultural, political and social changes that transformed Egypt in the twentieth century are testament not only to her talent but also her tenacity and ambition. The rumors of drug abuse

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and illicit affairs that plagued her at the height of her success, given the time and place, might have destroyed a lesser artist. But as Nassib recounts, Om Kalthoum was as determined as she was talented, and finally, nothing could assuage the adoration of her fans.

An international bestseller chronicles the adventures of twelve-year-old Annetta, desperate to get away from her

One of the issues left untouched by the Brussels Convention of 27

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September 1968 (and by the Brussels-1 Regulation replacing it) concerns the leeway left to domestic courts when applying European rules on international jurisdiction in civil and commercial matters. For

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instance, is the court under a duty of strict compliance with the jurisdiction rule as it is drafted? Would such a duty go so far as to require the court to abide by the jurisdiction rule, even though it is being used by one of the

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litigants to achieve an unfair result, for example to delay adjudication on the merits?
Under what conditions may the Court decline jurisdiction on account of any unsuitable forum shopping, thus ruling out the

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European provision on jurisdiction? Recent litigation in the ECJ has yielded rather, even excessively, restrictive answers, ruling out any discretion by domestic courts to remedy any inconvenience arising from the

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strict application of the European provisions, if such discretion were provided for by the lex fori (the Gasser case, the Turner case, and the Owusu case). This series of rulings from the ECJ raises several questions. Most

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observers have questioned the appropriateness of prescribing a blind application of European rules on jurisdiction by domestic courts, relying on the legal traditions of EC Member States usually providing for corrective

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mechanisms - such as 'forum non conveniens' in English Law and 'exception de fraude' in French Law - in cases when a party abusively triggers the jurisdiction of a court in order to obtain an unjust advantage, thus

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practising unacceptable forum shopping. The time has now come for an analysis, under both Community and comparative law, of the ramifications of the recent Gasser/Turner/Owusu cases. Readers will find in this

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book a collection of studies by some of the leading English and French experts today, analysing the ins and outs of jurisdiction and forum shopping in Europe. A beautiful, oddly carved violin becomes the link between two

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In the course of their researches for

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Mental Imagery in the Child (1971), the authors came to appreciate that action may be more conducive to the formation and conservation of images than is mere perception. This raised the problem of memory and its relation to intelligence, which they examine in this title, originally published in English

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in 1973. Through the analysis primarily of the child's capacity for remembering additive and multiplicative logical structures, and his remembrance of causal and spatial structures, the authors investigate whether memories pursue their own course, regardless of the intelligence

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or whether, in specified conditions, mnemonic improvements may be due to progress in intelligence. They examine the relationship between the memory's figurative aspects (from perceptive recognition to the memory-image) and its operational aspects (the schemata of the intelligence), and

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stress the fundamental significance of the mnemonic level known as the 'reconstructive memory'. This was a pioneering work at the time, presenting illuminating conclusions drawn from extensive research, together with a number of constructive ideas which opened up a fresh approach to an

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important area of educational
psychology.
