By participating in meetings and social functions with elite women in several Texas cities, and conducting systematic interviews, the author gained unprecedented access to elite women across racial and ethnic categories. *The Power of Good Deeds* provides new insights and greater depth to our knowledge about the upper classes and how the charitable activities of privileged women contribute to the process of legitimization, maintaining an ideology

of class-based and race-based segregation in the United States.

Why and how do contemporary questions of culture so readily become highly charged questions of identity?
